DAY 1

Keswick & the surrounding area

Home to the pencil, Keswick has a rich industrial heritage. Its story is told through interactive museums and a working slate mine.

Threlkeld Quarry & Mining Museum Quarry, Threlkeld, Keswick CA12 4TT

In an extensive former quarry complex just three miles east of Keswick, this museum explores the relationship between local geology and primary industry processes like quarrying and mining. It's home to vintage excavators and mining equipment - you can even take a ride on the quarry's own steam railway!

Derwent Pencil Museum Southey Works, Keswick CA12 5NG

Graphite was first discovered in the Borrowdale area in the 1560s, giving Keswick claim to being the home of the pencil. This museum tells the tale. It's also home to secret WW2 pencils with hidden maps; the Guinness World Record for the largest colour pencil; Queen Elizabeth's diamond Jubilee pencil; miniature pencil sculptures; and more!

Venture into the heart of Fleetwith Pike with a guided tour of the mine through underground tunnels and caverns. Honister Slate Mine is famous for the production of Westmorland Green Slate and you can buy unique items made from this beautiful stone in the gift shop.

DAY 2

Head to The Western Lake District and Coast

Whitehaven was once a major industrial town with the third largest trading port in Britain. Uncover its story through interactive museums and attractions.



Overlooking Whitehaven's harbour, this fascinating museum tells the tale of the local area, with interactive exhibits on its social, industrial and maritime heritage. There's also a stunning viewing gallery offering breath-taking views of Whitehaven and the Solway Coast.

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GOOD TO KNOW:

A 'quiet hour' is held on the first Sunday of the month.

Florence Arts Centre Florence Mine, Egremont CA22 2NR

Once the last working deep iron ore mine in Europe, Florence Mine closed in 2007 and was repurposed into the Florence Arts Centre. Today it is a fantastic hub for the arts, with regular events and a gallery featuring a changing programme of exhibitions from local artists.

DAY 3

The Western Lake District and Coast

Spend the day exploring the area's industrial heritage with a trip to a working watermill and a heritage centre.



Dating back to 1574, Eskdale Mill is the last working water-powered corn mill in the Lake District. Sitting in a beautiful wooded location, there are interactive exhibitions to enjoy, as well as historic gardens and grounds complete with nature trail and picnic area.





TOP TIP: Use the historic Ravenglass and Eskdale Railway to visit the mill. Disembark at Dalegarth and follow the signs for Boot village - the mill is a 10 minute walk.

Millom Heritage & Arts Centre Station Buildings, Station Rd, Millom LA18 5AA

The coastal town of Millom is steeped in industrial heritage, from the Bronze Age right through to WW2. At this museum, located in the town's beautifully restored railway station, discover the important role Millom played in the manufacture of iron and steel.





Stretching from Haverigg to Millom beach, Hodbarrow's impressive sea wall was built in the early 1900s to protect the local mine from flooding. Today, it's part of the RSPB Hodbarrow Nature Reserve. Visitors can walk along the wall - be sure to stop halfway to admire Hodbarrow Lighthouse.
